SAINT OF THE WEEK



St Charles Borromeo
(Feast day: 4th Nov)



Saint Charles Borromeo was born in 1538 in the castle of Arona near Lake Maggiore, Italy. His family, one of the most respected and ancient in Lombardy, was known for its great men of virtue. His father, Count Gilbert Borromeo, set a strong example of faith and charity, beginning every meal only after giving alms to the poor and practicing rigorous fasting. Charles' mother, the Countess, shared this deep commitment to Christian virtue, raising their family of two sons and four daughters to honor their faith in all things. The family's influence extended to Charles' uncle, John Angelo

Medici, who later became Pope Pius IV, impacting Charles' life profoundly.

From a young age, Charles displayed an earnest devotion to God and a love for study. At twelve, he inherited an abbey from his paternal uncle, yet insisted that the income be used for the poor, demonstrating his early sense of justice. His father recognized this and encouraged Charles' commitment to an ecclesiastical vocation. After Count Gilbert's death, Charles continued his studies in law at Pavia, remaining steadfast in his sense of purpose. When his uncle became pope, Charles was appointed cardinal and later Archbishop of Milan, despite his young age. Charles quickly became instrumental in the reform efforts of the Council of Trent, emphasizing the need for better education, discipline, and clarity in the Church. Upon returning to Milan, he tirelessly implemented the Council's decrees, founding seminaries, establishing schools of Christian doctrine, and enforcing discipline among clergy and laity alike. Though criticism followed him, he remained steadfast, living simply with only one meal per day, often just bread and water, and even keeping a priest known to criticize him in his household, showing humility and forbearance.

During the outbreak of plague in Milan, Saint Charles showed profound pastoral courage. When many fled the city, he remained, ministering to the sick and the dying. He sold nearly all his possessions, including his bedding, to provide for those in dire need. Refusing to leave his flock, he believed that a true bishop must remain with his people, choosing what is most perfect and sacrificial. Charles' dedication and compassion during this crisis solidified his reputation as a shepherd who would sacrifice all for his flock.

Saint Charles passed away after nearly twenty-five years of service, leaving a legacy of courage, reform, and unwavering charity. Known for his miraculous intercessions after death, he was canonized by Pope Paul V in 1610. Today, Saint Charles Borromeo stands as a model of pastoral zeal and holiness, a bishop who lived what he preached and left an indelible mark of faith on the people of Milan and the entire Church.
