

St Anthony of the Desert, born in 251 in Upper Egypt, is known as the Father of Monasticism. Raised in a wealthy Christian family, Anthony was deeply influenced by his faith. At the age of 20, he attended a Mass where the words of Jesus pierced his heart: "If you would be perfect, go, sell what you have and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven" (Matthew 19:21). Taking these words literally, he sold his vast inheritance, ensuring his younger sister's education and care, and embarked on a life of solitude

and prayer.

Eager to grow in holiness, Anthony sought out an older hermit to guide him. He also visited other holy men, learning from their virtues and imitating their practices. Eventually, Anthony withdrew completely from society, taking up residence in an abandoned structure. He sealed its entrance, dedicating himself to God through intense prayer, fasting, and penance.

Anthony's life in solitude became a battleground for spiritual warfare. The devil attacked him with severe temptations, appearing as monstrous beasts and physically harming him. On one occasion, demons beat him so badly that he was found unconscious and thought dead. Yet, upon recovering, Anthony insisted on returning to his solitude, declaring, "I fear you not; you cannot separate me from the love of Christ." His unwavering faith drove away the devils, and Christ appeared to console and strengthen him.

Anthony's discipline was extraordinary. He ate only bread and water, sometimes fasting for days. His clothing was simple—sackcloth and sheepskin—and he often spent entire nights in prayer. His profound holiness and spiritual wisdom attracted many followers who sought his counsel. Though he loved solitude, he eventually established two monasteries, creating a rule of life for his disciples. This marked the beginning of cenobitic monasticism, a form of communal monastic living.

In 311, during the persecution of Christians under Emperor Maximinus, Anthony briefly left his desert retreat to visit Alexandria. He comforted persecuted Christians and defended the faith against the Arian heresy, which denied the divinity of Christ. Despite his growing fame, he soon returned to an even more remote solitude.

In his later years, at the age of 90, Anthony received a vision instructing him to seek Saint Paul the Hermit, another ascetic. Their meeting symbolized the bond between the early hermits. Anthony lived until the remarkable age of 105, passing away peacefully in a cave on Mount Kolzim near the Red Sea. In humility, he instructed his disciples to bury him in an unmarked grave to avoid the veneration of his body.

Saint Anthony's life, as chronicled by Saint Athanasius, serves as a model of virtue and perseverance. His unwavering faith, humility, and devotion laid the foundation for Christian monasticism, inspiring countless souls to seek God with undivided hearts. His legacy remains a guiding light for those striving for holiness.
