

# THE BAPTISMAL CHARACTER OF THE

# ANCIENT VIGIL OF PENTECOST



The ancient Vigil of Pentecost had a deeply baptismal character, mirroring the Easter Vigil, but this meaning was largely lost in the 1955 reform of Holy Week under Pope Pius XII. Msgr. Léon Gromier lamented that the reform stripped Pentecost Vigil of its baptismal identity, turning it into an ordinary day and undermining its liturgical integrity.

Originally, the early Church celebrated the entire Paschal Mystery - Christ's death, resurrection, and the gift of the Holy Spirit - within the Easter liturgy. Over time, the Church spread these mysteries across different liturgical days, leading to a distinct

Pentecost celebration. Since ancient times, Pentecost served as a secondary baptismal occasion after Easter. Baptism, Confirmation, and the Eucharist were administered together, especially to adults, a practice still maintained in the Eastern Churches.

Cardinal Schuster emphasized the link between Baptism and Confirmation, noting that the latter completes the former by bringing the Holy Spirit into the soul and confirming the neophyte in Christ. The word Confirmatio itself signified the spiritual sealing by the Holy Spirit. It also referred to the epiklesis in the Mass, where the priest invokes the Spirit upon the gifts, reinforcing the sacramental connection between the Mass and Confirmation.

Tertullian already noted Pentecost as a solemn day for Baptism, indicating that catechumens were prepared during the 50 days following Easter. The symbolism was clear: just as the Holy Spirit descended upon the apostles, so too did He descend on the baptized through the bishop's blessing. Letters from Pope Siricius and Pope St. Leo the Great confirmed the practice of baptisms on Pentecost, the latter urging the bishops of Sicily to imitate St. Peter, who baptized 3,000 on the first Pentecost.

Liturgical books preceding the 16th-century Tridentine reform retained the Pentecost Vigil's baptismal elements. Dom Guéranger described how the faithful gathered on Pentecost Eve for the nightlong liturgy, similar to Easter. Baptisms were administered to those unable or unready at Easter. Six Old Testament prophecies (rather than twelve) were read, and the Paschal Candle was again lit. The Mass followed in the early morning hours.

Over time, practical changes occurred. By the 12th century, the vigil was moved to the afternoon. Infant baptisms soon after birth became common, reducing the need for large baptismal liturgies on Pentecost. Nevertheless, the vigil retained a penitential and baptismal tone.

Fr Pius Parsch described the day as one of penance and preparation marked by fasting and abstinence in some places. Christians were called to recall their baptism and prepare spiritually for the coming of the Holy Spirit. Despite reforms, the Vigil of Pentecost historically remained a powerful echo of the Church's ancient baptismal identity.
