Prayer for the election of the Sovereign Pontiff

V/I will raise Me up a faithful priest, who shall do according to My Heart and My soul. R./AndI will build him a faithful houses and he shall walk all day before My Anointed.

Let us pray.

We most humbly entreat Thee, O Lord, that Thy boundless goodness may grant as pontiff to the most holy Roman Church one who shall ever be both pleasing to Thee, by his loving zeal in our regard, and, by his beneficent rule, deeply revered by Thy people to the glory of Thy name. Through Christ our Lord. R./ Amen.

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The election of a new pope begins with a solemn and public Mass called "Pro Eligendo Romano Pontifice"—"For the Election of the Roman Pontiff." This Mass will be celebrated in St. Peter's Basilica, with Cardinal Giovanni Battista Re, the Dean of the College of Cardinals, as the main celebrant. During the Mass, Cardinal Re will pray for divine guidance, asking God to grant the Church a shepherd who is holy and fully dedicated to the service of God's people.

ELECTION OF THE NEW POPE

This is the only public ceremony before the conclave begins. After the Mass, the cardinals who are under the age of 80 and thus eligible to vote will gather privately in the Pauline Chapel of the Apostolic Palace. From there, they process prayerfully into the Sistine Chapel while singing the Litany of the Saints—a solemn chant that calls upon saints from both East and West, as well as a series of invocations to Christ.

Once inside the Sistine Chapel, the cardinals sing "Veni, Creator Spiritus" ("Come, Creator Spirit"), invoking the Holy Spirit to guide them in the important task of electing a new pope. Each cardinal then takes an oath to follow the rules of the election and to maintain strict secrecy about everything that takes place within the conclave. They also swear that, if elected, they will faithfully carry out the duties of the papacy.

Once all the oaths are taken, the Vatican's master of liturgical ceremonies announces "Extra omnes!"—"Everyone out!"—and all nonessential personnel leave the chapel. A spiritual reflection is then offered to the cardinals by a designated preacher; for this conclave, that will be Cardinal Raniero Cantalamessa, who, though not eligible to vote, has been asked to offer a meditation. After his reflection, he too departs, and the conclave officially begins.

The cardinals may hold a vote on the first evening, followed by up to four votes per day—two in the morning and two in the afternoon. After each vote, the ballots are burned. If no pope is elected, black smoke rises from the chimney. If a cardinal receives a two-thirds majority (for example, 89 votes if 133 electors are present), white smoke signals to the world that a new pope has been chosen.

Once elected, the new pope is asked two questions: whether he accepts his election and what name he wishes to take. If he accepts, he immediately becomes the Bishop of Rome and the supreme pontiff. The cardinals then show him homage and sing the Te Deum, a hymn of thanksgiving. Shortly after, the senior cardinal deacon appears on the central balcony of St. Peter's Basilica to announce: "Habemus Papam"—"We have a pope."
